Most Americans know of the internment of Japanese Americans in World War II, but few know that this nation also interned 15,000 German and Italian Americans during the war. Even fewer people know that on July 1, 1942, the Federal Bureau of Investigation searched the homes of 225 residents of Altoona, Pennsylvania, home of the Horseshoe Curve, suspecting that these "alien enemies" were Nazi sympathizers.
